

Partnership

The Indiana Head Start State Collaboration Office is located in the Bureau of Child Care and overseen by the Division of Family Resources. Their mission is to ensure Head Start's participation in systems-integration strategies to benefit low-income children and families by means such as helping build early childhood systems and enhancing access to comprehensive services and support. A priority area for the Head Start Collaboration Office is to work with local partners such as institutions of higher education and professional organizations such as the Council for Professional Recognition to assist in the development of and support for high quality career development opportunities for early childhood educators.

State Scholarship Opportunities

Indiana Association for the Education of Young Children (INAEYC): The T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® INDIANA CDA Assessment Scholarships are awarded by INAEYC. Scholarship opportunities include CDA® Assessment and/or Renewal, Career and Technical Education/Vocational High School CDA® Assessment,

and CDA Process at Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana. The Scholarship covers 90% of the CDA® Assessment Fee and a bonus upon receipt of the CDA® Credential. The bonus is not applicable for Career and Technical Education/Vocational High School Students.

Stephanie has a special bond with the children and families she serves at Shining Stars Childcare home in East Chicago. What is the CDA®?

The Child Development Associate[®] (CDA) Credential[™] is the most widely recognized credential in early childhood education (ECE) and is a key stepping-stone on the path of career advancement in ECE.

The CDA credential is based on a core set of competency standards, which guide early care professionals as they work toward becoming qualified teachers of young children. The Council works to ensure that the nationally transferable CDA is a credible and valid credential, recognized by the profession as a vital part of professional development.

CDAs have knowledge of how to put the CDA Competency Standards into practice and understanding of why those standards help children move with success from one developmental stage to another. Put simply, CDAs know how to nurture the emotional, physical, intellectual, and social development of children.

Earning the CDA credential has many advantages, including exposure to the larger community of early childhood educators. **Over 800,000 CDA credentials have been issued to date!**

Becoming a CDA is a big commitment, but one that creates confident practitioners with command of today's best practices for teaching young children.

Meet the Council
